Before You Go Public: Crafting Your Professional Identity

Before you can communicate your professional work to others, it is important to reflect on what you want: how do you see yourself as a professional? How do you want your work to matter to others in the world? This introductory session, drawing on strategies from career and professional development experts, aims to help you answer these questions and craft your professional identity before you start talking to other people (e.g., at conferences, in publications, on social media, etc.).
